Message from the Executive Director

We are extremely lucky to have an amazing team of people: passionate, professional and committed to delivering incredible outdoor adventure learning programs. It is a privilege to be a part of such a vibrant respectful community that loves what it is doing.

As a crew, we are enjoying making the most of opportunities to learn, innovate and grow. We are expanding our facilitation and activities tool kits, taking programs to new alpine areas and rivers, working with new school partners and community groups, and embracing the diversity of what we do, from one to thirty day programs.

The new gear-issue shelter-shed, amenities and Ops Office at Tharwa, combined with the bushcraft workshops area, completes the renewal of 'down below' at Tharwa. As we prepare for construction to start on the new Communal Centre at Tharwa in 2025, our fundraising efforts are more pressing than ever. This is hard work. We are extremely grateful for the support we have received from government and philanthropic partners. This is improving our capacity to impact the lives of young people, which young people need now more than ever.

Momentum has been building with the continuing development of NatCORR (National Centre for Outdoor Risk and Readiness). Our work delivering professional development workshops, digital tools, research and engagement with the Bureau of Meteorology and disaster management sector is enhancing our resilience. This important sector-wide initiative is being well received in Australia and recognised Internationally.

The financial story continues to be positive. We are weathering increases in insurance, food and fuel costs, continuing to uplift field crew salaries and keeping tight controls on overheads. The FY24 operating surplus supports our continued facilities renewal and prudential reserves policy. Financial management in the outdoors sector is not easy – we remain vulnerable to weather, market shifts and increasing regulatory hurdles. The Board, with our partners Blue Rock, the National Audit Group and Dentons, play a pivotal role in generously bringing the wisdom needed to steer our way forward. We are very lucky – I can't imagine a better team.

Thank you to the whole Outward Bound community. Lets enjoy 'the vibe' and celebrate the great 2024 we achieved together.

Outward Bound Impact



Outward Bound programs inspire individuals to develop skills and habits that have lifelong value for participants and society at large. Our programs offer a place for people to step out of the pressure of structured, urban and digitally crowded lives and into wide open spaces, where life is simplified, nature inspires and new experiences and adventure abound.

Social Return on Investment

In 2024, Outward Bound International partnered with Accenture Development Partnerships to conduct a Social Return on Investment (SROI) analysis to estimate the impact of Outward Bound's programs measured against the cost to deliver. The SRO quantifies the global economic, social and environmental value that Outward Bound generates for every dollar spent, revealing the transformative & rippling impact of Outward Bound programs.

\$9 of social value is created for every \$1 invested into Outward Bound



Outward Bound Outcomes Survey

The **Outward Bound Outcomes Survey** is a statistically validated and reliable measurement tool used on our programs. Ongoing analysis of the data collected shows significant evidence of growth in: resilience, self-confidence, compassion, social competence and environmental responsibility.

Tharwa Campus and Programs

Tharwa remains our major hub for both programs in the ACT and our operational planning and support. The campus renewal project is continuing, with the completion of the 'down below' area, and our Ops team was very excited to move into their new Operations Office after spending 12 months in their temporary home. The bushcraft workshops have been a big success with participants, and the area around the Possum Shed kitchen has become a focal point for cooking and gathering. The vehicle yard and maintenance areas are neatly organised and are in full use, away from participant areas. We are also pleased to have the Shelter Shed complete so that participants can use the new undercover area and toilets and shower block.

Expedition programs continue to be the main feature on our calendar for Tharwa - making the most of the adjacent Namadgi National Park, and the neighbouring surrounds along the Murrumbidgee corridor and up into the Brindabella ranges. It is amazing how quickly we move beyond the suburbs of Canberra into bushland that continues to recover from the fires. We are extremely lucky to have Tharwa as our home, to embark upon adventures! The start of the year tends to feature programs designed to connect participants together - with Year 7 orientation programs and senior school leadership groups as well as supporting a range of community programs.

As the weather turns colder over the winter months, cabin-based programs provide opportunities for on-campus learning, with bushcraft workshops, high ropes activities and team-building initiatives. We are pleased that the new campus facilities provide flexibility to adapt to severe weather. With Spring comes our extremely busy season and a wide range of programs, including extended expeditions that bring us to the end of the year. We are extremely grateful for the warm community relationships that support our work, with thanks to our neighbours at Booroomba, Cappacumbalong and Namadgi National Park.

A new Ops Office adjacent to the Ops Shed brings improved efficiencies and oversight of the Ops Area. The new office is smart, functional, and well insulated for both the heat and cold.

The new Shelter Shed provides an all weather gear issue and learning space and a new toilet and shower block for participants. The design is both practical and aesthetic thanks to SDA architects and builders Ethical Construction Projects.

Tharwa Campus Future Vision

A stone's throw from Canberra, on the banks of the Murrumbidgee River and on the doorsteps of the mountains, Tharwa has been our home since 1978. Our 11 hectare property was set up with 'make-do' facilities to house our staff and equipment, and provide a national base from which to support our expeditions. Now, nearly 50 years later, we realise it is time to reimagine and re-vitalise our home at Tharwa.

Our vision is to transform the Tharwa site, to fulfil its potential as an outdoor learning campus and expand our outdoor adventure experiences with improved activities and campsite facilities. It will offer camping and cabin accommodation to extend Outward Bound's reach and create more resilient options when climatic conditions are severe.

A masterplan developed in 2021 by award winning Sally Draper Architects and TCL Landscape Design provides the blueprint for the site. Already over the last 2 years we have invested \$1.5m in refurbishing the old farm sheds to become an inspiring learning space as bushcraft workshops for our participants, including an indoor function centre and a woodfire pizza-making oven.

We have also created a new logistics & vehicle hub for our gear, equipment and catering, upgraded toilet and shower amenities, and renovated our program operations office.

The new Communal Building will become the heart of the campus for Outward Bound participants, crew and the broader community. It will be the central gathering point for meals, events and end of program celebrations.

It will also host the National Centre for Outdoor Risk and Readiness (NatCORR), an Outward Bound initiative to help the outdoors sector to prepare for the impacts of climate change. The Communal Building will serve as a catalyst for connection, dialogue and shared experience, fostering community, collaboration and engagement with the environment.

Design for the new Communal Building



The building design and orientation embraces the bush landscape views in two directions, looking out to Mt Tennent and the beckoning ranges, and opening vistas to engage with the bushland outdoor activity areas towards the Murrumbidgee River. The design features rustic natural materials, textures and earthy colours that blend with the bush and are respectful of the land as Ngunnawal and Ngambi Country. The galvanised iron pavilion form reflects inspiration from the iconic historic woolsheds that adorn neighbouring properties.

The building will be composed of three linked pavilions: a main central pavilion providing a large dining and events space with integrated indoor and outdoor decks accommodating up to 140 people; a welcome reception area and smaller meeting rooms and administration space; and kitchen and amenities forming the third pavilion. The separate pavilions allow for flexible use zones and enables the building to nestle within the landscape.

This new Communal Building will replace the small (capacity 60), sterile dining facilities in the current 'admin block'. It is the most pivotal, largest cost part of the transformation. It will **enable us double participant capacity for programs** in the ACT.



With the new Communal Centre operational by 2026, our goal is to annually host 6,000 participants, by reaching 20,000 participant days across 100 programs by 2030. This materially expands Outward Bounds reach and impact in a tangible, long-lasting way. The building planning and design is near completion and we are aiming for our partner Ethical Construction Projects to commence construction in January 2025. With \$3.4m funding secured towards the total \$5m building cost, we are on the cusp of realising this project.

Victoria and the Snowy River

This year we enjoyed delivering a range of new programs on the Snowy River, as well as expanding program areas to some locations across Victoria. We made the most of our new facilities on Booramby Farm and were excited to take our new fleet of inflatable kayaks out on the water! This gives us flexibility to travel the Snowy at high and low river levels.

The iconic Snowy River rafting expedition gained a lot of interest this year and we partnered with more clients in delivering the full 6-day rafting program, utilising our privileged access to the river and facilities. This amazing wilderness journey on the Snowy River has been enjoyed by both participants and crew alike! Thanks to the Federal Government bushfire recovery grant, we purchased a fleet of 40 two-person kayaks to support our ability to run paddling program across a much wider range of river levels. The grant funded facilities development also included a complete rebuild of our solar energy system in order to support our power needs. This has enabled us to install a cool room and washing machine on site. This is supporting the continuity of program delivery in this remote area and ensuring we have technology support for risk and safety.

Over the ANZAC long weekend, we hosted our bi-annual working bee at Booramby to celebrate the completion of the works made possible by the Bushfire recovery grant. We hosted the Buchan Primary school for a day of activities and tree planting. We look forward to making it an annual event for the community. The weekend also allowed for plenty of time to engage with our local partners and supporters, including a paddle in the new kayaks and fire-side dinners!

The "Buchan Bus Run" (end of program crew run from base towards Buchan, with the bus giving runners a 45 minute head start) is becoming famous, and can now be found on Instagram (@buchanbusrun). With sticker awards, Strava segments, and running shirts on the way, plans are in development for broader community engagement into next year.

Across Victoria, we are continuing to explore and expand into new locations. We ran an inaugural Mansfield/Mt Stirling program in May, which included bushwalking around Mt Stirling and cycling on the Great Victorian Rail Trail from Mansfield to Bonnie Doon.



The magic of "Whiskey Whiskey" has also gained attention from schools on the East coast, with Melbourne Grammar School joining us in WA for one of their 20-day, Beyond the Gates Expeditions in late 2024.


Western Australian operations kicked off 2024 with the second iteration of the Gutsy Girls program; our all-women Summer adventure! This is a truly successful program nominated for the Best Program Award at the National Outdoor Education Conference at the end of 2024. It is now ready for it's third year in January 2025.

As Summer blended into Autumn, we welcomed back our long term partner, Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School, for their annual Yr 10 expedition program - a 10 day journey that is the capstone of their outdoor education journey. After the Winter break, we returned to Walpole in September for our annual Expedition program. This year, every participant on the program was sponsored. This program continues to be supported by the Denmark Lions Club and Black Dog Ride who sponsors local students from Denmark High School.

Geraldton Grammar students – both year 9 and 11 attended their program in Walpole in October, with beautiful weather, and barely a drop of rain to report over their 11 days. The Walpole Primary School came for a day of activities on "The Block" with us – which included team problem solving, low ropes, fire building and damper making. We are hoping to make this a community building annual event!

Our Walpole base undertook a refresh over September. The areas of focus were the teachers' and staff accommodation and communal kitchen. These areas got a fresh coat of paint, new floorboards, over 15 new bed frames and new furniture. Our relationship with the Walpole Workcamp also supported some minor works on site, such as the gutter replacement.

We continue to be extremely grateful for the generosity of Toyota WA in their ongoing loan of a Landcruiser. It also been great to have a cohort of their Toyota WA trainees come out on program with us at Walpole for a week of professional development.



Public Programs and Duke of Edinburgh's Award



At Outward Bound, Public Programs include our Holiday Programs, Family Adventures, Junior programs, Leadership programs, Expeditions, and our Gutsy Girls Adventure. We also continued to run open-enrolment Adventurous Journeys for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

In 2024, our Family Adventure sold out for the first time since 2017. The program saw 8 families come together for 5 days to adventure and experience the beautiful environment in and around our Tharwa base. We ran four Junior programs (12-15 y.o) in 2024, all of which were fully subscribed. It is fast becoming the most popular of our Public Programs, with participants registered up to a year in advance. The Leadership program (15-24 y.o) continued to have strong registration and gained interest by those doing the Duke of Edinburgh's Award, with 56% of participants attributing the program towards their Gold Residential Project.




Family Adventure Program

The Outward Bound Expedition program is now being offered at all of our main operational locations: Tharwa, Snowy River, and Walpole. An application process was introduced this year, with participants first submitting a 2-minute video answering the question, "Why do you want to come on the Expedition program?" We received some amazing responses, and an improved readiness of participants to embrace the range of experiences on the 10-day program. It also helps us to align the program to achieve differing personal goals.



Spring Junior Program

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Adventurous Journeys have had steady registrations throughout 2024. In February, the Award's requirements were updated to allow Practice Journeys to be reduced to 1-day for Bronze and Silver, and 1-day/1-night for Gold. Outward Bound responded by introducing 4-day Silver and 5-day Gold options, allowing participants to complete all requirements with one journey. While most of our Adventurous Journeys continue to be based around Sydney, new routes in ACT and VIC were opened. The VIC Great Ocean Walk journeys have gained quick traction, selling out in each instance.

The National Centre for Outdoor Risk and Readiness (NatCORR) is now well established in the outdoor sector in Australia, and is gaining international attention, particularly in North America. We have grown our team, expanded our scope and had a significant impact on helping the outdoors sector to adapt and prepare for increasingly volatile environmental conditions with climate change.

At the beginning of the year, NatCORR formed a 12-person volunteer Advisory Board to help guide direction and provide expertise from across the sector. They are a diverse, knowledgeable and experienced group who add much to the work of NatCORR and we are extremely grateful for their contribution.

This year we have transitioned from our planning and industry consultation phase into delivery and creation. After extensive consultation on how NatCORR can best support the outdoors in a changing climate, we are excited to be developing a range of the Outdoor Risk Intelligence (ORI) tools, which are scheduled to be launched early in 2025. The applications, ORI Heat and ORI Track, will assist with heat stress risk management, and incident reporting / tracking aligned with weather conditions. We are working closely with researchers from the University of Sydney and technology developers BrainstormIT on these important innovations.

Greg Stagbouer formally joined us as ORI Project Manager role in June 2024, after 6 months of volunteering his time on this project. We plan to have a prototype completed by January with the official launch in March 2025.



Our National Outdoor Sector Weather Survey was co-authored by the Bureau of Meteorology and launched in February, had 140 responses from a range of organisations across the country. After a thorough analysis of the data, we presented the results in an online webinar to an audience of 72 with many more viewing the recording. The results of this survey have governed the content of the Industry Weather Workshops we will be running in April 2025, in partnership with the Bureau of Meteorology.

After the resounding success of our Incident Response Workshops in 2023, we again partnered with Dr Clare Dallat from Risk Resolve to deliver four more workshops in August 2024. We attracted 77 participants to the workshops with Melbourne selling out once again. An Organisational Resilience workshop, and a number of other presentations will be run at the National Outdoor Education Conference in December 2024.

The outdoor industry is already being adversely affected by change in weather patterns and the maladapted technologies currently in use. NatCORR's Outdoor Risk Intelligence (ORI) apps are currently in development stage with the 'go-live' date set for March 2025.

ORI TRACK - Incident and Business Disruption Reporting & Analysis

ORI Track will be an AI interfaced reporting and tracking tool for organisations to capture and track information on outdoor risk incidents and business continuity disruption, with associated weather and environmental conditions data.

ORI Heat will be developed in partnership with leading global research academics from the Heat and Health Research Incubator from the University of Sydney through their commercialisation vehicle EMU Pty Ltd.

Community contributions of all types, as well as generous financial support from donors and philanthropy, have shaped the work and the physical presence of Outward Bound in Australia over the last 60 years. From Kirby Hall, to the Fairfax Ropes Course, to the new digger named 'Sally' in honour of one of our most reliable supporters, our movement would not be as strong and effective without their generosity. Thank you to all our valued donors and contributors this last year.

As part of 'reimagining' the future of our organisation, we commenced the work of re-engaging with the philanthropic sector more broadly and building our internal capacity to service and steward them and the next generation of donors to our organisation. From our new base at Tharwa, through to the national initiative we are auspicing at NatCORR, we have exciting new initiatives to engage donors leveraging off the several government grants secured following the bushfires and the pandemics. These initiatives represent the very renewal that follows any fire, and we are excited to see these projects engage the imagination of new supporters and donors.

Meanwhile, the community and access programs that have ensured our programs are available to those who might want or need them most, have continued throughout 2023/24. We supported 251 participants from 9 partner organisations in Outward Bound programs pro or low-bono thanks to donations to AOBDF. This represented 984 participant days and included indigenous boys from Karabar Clontarf Academy and Follow the Dream, disengaged young people from Galilee School and the Engage Queanbeyan PCYC program and adults recovering through drug and alcohol addiction with Karralika and Ngunnawal Bush Healing Farm.

Kalbarri District HS were supported by GMA Garnet Group to attend a program in Walpole, WA. GMA operate a Garnet mine in the Kalbarri region and is a great example of how a business can support their future community leaders through sponsoring a leadership program with Outward Bound.

In total, \$100,218 in Community programs were delivered in partnership with STARTTS, Legacy Club Services, Kookaburra Kids, Soldier On and Follow the Dream and donations from Mr John Atkin, Mr Ed MacCartney and The Vine Foundation.

Going forward, we'd love for these community programs to continue to build and grow. And we would also like to put a call out to our generous community to get in touch with us about our broader capital appeal for the Tharwa base. The architects drawings and the reconceptualization of the Tharwa base are exciting to behold, and we'll be reaching out to our alumni community for their support as we continue to build towards our fundraising target of \$5m. With contributions from government and philanthropy of \$3.4m already secured, we are 68% of the way there!

A big thank you to Anna Hyles who has stepped up as Chair of our Committee looking into fundraising for these exciting projects, and to Loren, Ian, Ben who have hosted state-based lunches and information sessions about OBA's contribution to the challenges facing young people today while building out our database and filling in applications forms to bring aligned funding support to our capital projects and programs. Building this internal capacity will pay dividends for the organisation into the future.

Community Support and Grants

Grants continue to play an important role in supporting Outward Bound to renew our facilities and support the environment, helping us catching up on a backlog of maintenance and aging infrastructure. We continue to take our grant responsibilities seriously, maintaining our focus on creating community value that aligns with government goals. In FY24, we are proud to have successfully completed a wide range of grant co-funded projects on time and to budget.



Tharwa Ropes Course



WA Environment Protection

The ACT Government's 2023 Community Sports Facilities Grant funded the extension and upgrade of the ropes course activities at the Tharwa campus to create a multi-use, flexible facility that can be accessed confidently by a wider catchment of students and members of the community. The works have been safety verified and registered with ACT government. Since February 2024, over 2000 young people have benefited from the upgrade.

The WA Community Stewardship Grant supported OB staff training from Gary Muir from WOW Wilderness Eco Tours to develop OB program service activities removing the invasive snail and purple Senecio from the Walpole-Nornalup inlet. This built on our relationships with the local community working to protect the environment. The Management of Walpole inlet's invasive species project is supported by funding from the Western Australian Government's State NRM Program.



Flammables Storage

Outward Bound Australia relocated the maintenance and machinery storage facilities to the rear of the operations area, away from participant access, building a storage shed out of recycled and repurposed materials to consolidate all the flammable fuels and oils into 2 separate lockable storage areas within the shed. The ACT Government's 2022-2023 Community Support and Infrastructure Grant provided funds for the storage units.



Ops Area Upgrade

Outward Bound's Operations Area Upgrade project was co-funded by the NSW Government Cross-Border Commissioner's Infrastructure Fund, the ACT Government's Tourism Product Development Fund and Outward Bound. The project is a significant capital investment for the Tharwa Campus, providing new undercover participant learning area and toilet and shower block. In the 3 months since completion, over 500 participants have used the facility and been sheltered from the sun and rain during gear issue and pack up.



The Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grant from the Australian Government funded installation of new shelters on our base in Victoria creating three self-contained campsites along the riverfront, enhancing our ability to provide a resilient and accommodating experience for groups, regardless of weather conditions. The grant also funded a new fleet of inflatable kayaks and a new solar and battery system to support our off-grid energy needs on base.



The Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Bushcraft Workshops project is complete. We have delighted in watching the renovation of the neglected Challenge Shed and the old Cuppacumbalong farm sheds to create bushcraft workshops and active learning spaces. The project received grant funding from the Australian Government, and was co-funded by Outward Bound Australia. The landscaping has been generously supported with red gravel from Tharwa Sands, thanks to Anna and John Hyles.



Thanks to Will and Jo Crowthers, the Upotipotpon Foundation has funded Solar power for all of the Operations Area at Tharwa. This will enable us to environmentally and cost effectively run the new commercial laundry facilities and hot water for the new showers. The grant will also add a state of the art commercial, water free composting machine to our operations, reducing our food waste and enriching the soils of our base.

Other grants that are work in progress for delivery in FY24 and beyond include:

- Energy Efficiency Grants for SME's Round 2 will insulate the prefabricated buildings at Tharwa to reduce our environmental impact.
- Black Dog Ride Australia has provided 5 young people in WA with full scholarships to attend OBA's Gutsy Girls Adventure and WA Expedition programs.
- East Gippsland Shire Council's Community Impact Grant will empower 30 Year 9 indigenous students to break the cycle of social disadvantage and remain in secondary school.
- The ACT Government's Tourism Product Development Fund has contributed to the cost of a new 12-seater transit van for our ops crew. We are super excited to welcome it to our working fleet.

Outward Bound offers alternative solutions to counter the increases in school refusal, substance abuse and mental health issues plaguing secondary school students across the country. 
